

THE DORMITION

The Dormition (Falling asleep) of the Mother of God is an event steeped in sacred Tradition, for no details concerning the last days of the earthly life of the God-bearer are mentioned in Scriptures. We do know that, according to the specific instructions of our Lord at His Crucifixion, the Apostle John took the God-bearer into his care, treating her as his own mother. In fact, it is believed that all of the Apostles continued to have a close relationship with the Virgin after Christ's Ascension. It is said that she frequently visited the places which were intimately connected with her Son's suffering, death and Resurrection. Her constant prayer at these holy sites was that she, too, would soon be taken to Heaven.

One day, while praying on the Mount of Olives, Mary witnessed an appearance of the Archangel Gabriel, who told her that in three days her earthly life would come to an end. Miraculously, the Apostles, with the exception of Thomas, were brought by Angels and clouds to John's house to bid farewell to the Blessed Mother. At the hour of her death, a light shone in the room where the God-bearer lay. Christ, Himself, surrounded by Angels, appeared and received her precious soul. She was buried, according to her wishes in the Garden of Gethsemane.

When the Apostle Thomas arrived three days later, he sadly asked to be taken to the tomb to see the Virgin's body one final time. When Mary's tomb was opened, the amazed Apostles found it empty! That evening they had a vision of the Mother of God in the radiance of heavenly glory. Her words to them are a constant assurance to all of us, of her role as one who intercedes for us before her Son: "Rejoice, I am with you always and will pray for you before God."

he Prophets of the Old Testament were divinely inspired preachers. Their vocation was *NOT* centered on foretelling the future, but rather on emphasizing the holiness of God, criticizing the moral decadence of their times and teaching a way of life that was more pleasing to the Lord.

On this morning's Church Bulletin, the **PROPHET MICAH** is depicted. Micah lived in the 8th century B.C. He is viewed by the Church as one of the **TWELVE MINOR PROPHETS**. Micah lived in the province of Judah, being a contemporary of other famous prophets, namely, Isaiah, Amos and Hosea. From his writings, we can clearly see that the quiet countryside region that was home to him was infected with the same sins that plagued the urban areas of the kingdom of Israel. Micah strongly denounces the rulers and priests of the Hebrew nation, deploring their dishonesty and their exploitation of the poor. He foretells the wrath of God falling upon Samaria and Jerusalem because of the prevailing weakness and sinfulness that exits there.

The message of the Prophet Micah, however, is not without hope. He also speaks of a glorious future for Jerusalem, where it will become the religious center of the world. Perhaps Micah's most powerful and best remembered prophecy concerns the birth of the Messiah: "BUT YOU, BETHLEHEM, IN THE LAND OF JUDAH, ARE NOT THE LEAST AMONG THE RULERS OF JUDAH; FOR OUT OF YOU SHALL COME A RULER WHO WILL SHEPHERD MY PEOPLE ISRAEL." As long as the Nativity of Christ is celebrated, the words of this humble prophet will live on!
